Children and Widows Protection and Fellowship Group (CWPFG) wants to recognize the challenges that young girls face worldwide. Especially in hard-to-reach areas, girls have limited access to education, given the barriers of poverty, gender-related violence, child marriage, teenage pregnancy and cultural beliefs that educating a boy is of more value than educating a girl. At CWPFG, we work to transcend those geographical, economic, and societal barriers in this remote village area. This is meant to empower young girls and women to achieve their greatest potential, enabling them to make positive decisions about their health with sexual reproductive education.

We recognize that our work not only uplifts girls but also their community; educating a girl and empowering a woman means greater economic prospects, reduced HIV risk and reduced inequality for future generations.

ODONGO KENAS was born in 1982 at a remote village in Nyatike sub county in Migori county. His father had 4 wives with a total of 26 children.

His mother was number three and had a total of 8 children.

He started schooling at Othora primary school, completing grade 8 exams in 1995. After passing his exams, he couldn't

proceed to high school immediately but had to stay at home for one full year.

He later joined secondary school in 1997 with the support of his American friend Debbie K. and in 2000 he sat for his high school exams.

From 2000 to 2004, Debbie sponsored his diploma course in medical laboratory sciences; he graduated and got a job at Ojele as a medical technologist.

In 2008 he was retrenched with many of his fellow workers. Later, in 2008, he joined Face Nyanza as a community lab technologist and in 2011 he decided to enroll for degrees in one of the universities in Uganda; Debbie assisted him and he graduated in 2014. In 2017 he left working as a medical laboratory technologist and joined Wiser girls which champions less fortunate girls in the society.

In 2019 he left Wiser and joined Oridi Girls to continue with his teaching career. He teaches Business Studies and Geography.

He says:

"I have been passionate for the plights of girl child since 1998 when I learnt bitter lessons because I missed joining Form 1 due to poverty.

"Were it not for Debbie's assistance, I would have not made it to school--a lot of thanks to her."



Vivian Awuor Odete was born in 1998. She started schooling at Rangenya Primary, and sat for grade 8 in 2013. Then she joined high school at Ogande Girls with the support of her mother, who deals in small scale trading activities.

She sat for KCSE in 2017 and later joined Kisumu Polytechnic for her

diploma in Accounting which was completed in 2021.

Currently, she is attached to CWPFG and says, enthusiastically, "This is the home where I belong!"

Dominic Okongo has worked with CWPFG since 2021, as a Counselor. He has a Bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Education and a Certificate as a Primary School teacher. He also is certified in HIV/AIDS instruction.

He says "I am happy with the current activities carried on by the group, which is uplifting the standards of underprivileged girls in the society."



I am **Sophy Collins**. I have been in CWPFG for over 5 years now. My role is to mentor young girls and women on various areas. The positive impact of CWPFG is great to society, and I am proud to be associated with CWPFG.

I run mentorship programs in different areas, and this has boosted the morale of young girls. I teach women entrepreneurship. The

challenge I have most is that these women do not have capital to start a business due to high rates of poverty in this area.
