
The F. W. Reproductive Health and Sexual Education Program Stories

School girls and women in marginalized regions and rural areas in Kenya have been using unhygienic materials such as torn pieces of cloth, mattress sponge, animal skin, old rags, leaves, cow dung or even digging a hole on the ground to sit on for the whole period as a means to manage their menstrual flow.

CWPFG, under the F.W. Reproductive Health and Sexual Education, is currently providing free sanitary towels for girls and women in this remote area in Kenya. It is also very involved in the distribution of contraceptives to adult women and underage mothers.



The following stories illustrate the effect of CWPFG on individuals receiving these supplies.



I am Anne Awuor aged 32 years old. I am married in a polygamous family of four women. I have 5 children and my cowives have a total of 16 children, making the entire family to have 21 children.

Our husband does nothing to earn even a single income; we have been struggling to raise our children—looking for food for them to eat, clothes to wear and taking care of them when sick.

I have benefited a lot from CWPFG; from February of this year (2024) I have been getting free contraceptives and this has helped me a lot.

Through its loan/grant I can testify that I have received the grant twice and now I am engaged in selling vegetables out of which I get some income.

Without CWPFG I could have sunken to a desperate and miserable life forever due to deep poverty.



I am Faith Akinyi, currently I am in Form Three. Sincerely a lot of thanks and gratitude to all donors who are supporting CWPFG.

Initially I used to miss 4 school days a month during my menses. Since April of this year (2024), through the F.W. Reproductive Health and Sexual Education Program, I am getting enough sanitary towels for three months.

During April 2024, 100 girls benefited and during August the number went higher, to 150. This calls for more willing donors to support this program so that many girls like me can be supported.

I am Violet Edwin. I am currently 28 years old.

I completed high school back in 2014, but since then I haven't gotten any job. I joined CWPFG 3 years back and I am a beneficiary of both the loan grant and reproductive health services offered by CWPFG.

Since April of this year (2024), I have a changed life; from my small business, I am able to get the necessary basics for survival. Moreso, the sanitary towels provided for free and the contraceptives are of great importance to many women like me.

I am Jane Akinyi, 26 years old. I am physically challenged. My husband is also physically challenged; we have 3 children. I could not afford to buy sanitary towels during my periods, so I used to cover myself with old clothes. This made me have infections every month.

Through F.W Reproductive Health and Sexual Education program, I am a beneficiary of free sanitary towels provision; we are being given these every four months. Thanks a lot for those who are supporting this program.
